#### News from the Garden

Work is ongoing with pruning the evergreen shrubs and the chipper/shredder is being well used.

The "Melancholy Walk" is becoming much more cheerful as time goes by.

Grass cutting is continuous and the new Flymo has proven its worth.

Work in the propagation area continues apace to provide plants for planting out in the garden and for sale. The area has now been gravelled which has improved the working environment.

There are plans to provide a couple of lower work benches within the propagation area so that plant activities can form part of Shuttleworth's educational programme for children.

Staff from GSK came to the Garden on 17 September as part of their company community engagement programme. Their very enthusiastic group of over 20 volunteers undertook shrub pruning by the Screen Gate and cleaned some of the urns to gain conservation experience.

It is now time to change the planting in the Tazza bed and the large pots situated around the garden to reflect the fact that Autumn is here. Conservation

The team has continued to work every two weeks cleaning and maintaining structures. In addition these "Eagle Eyes" spot weakness and growing damage in structures.

The Summer House requires our attention and we are working on obtaining an official condition report, which will contain options for consideration by the Estate Committee.

Prices are £10 for adults, £2.50 for children (3 to 16), Under 3 free. Glow stick bracelets are included with your ticket.



# Closing Ceremony for the 200 year celebrations Sunday 3 November 2pm to 4pm

It is hoped to combine this ceremony with the "unveiling" of a statue of Diana of Gabes which has been purchased by the Friends to replace a statue that was known to have been in the Garden in the early 20th century. The Friends Committee felt that the statue would be a suitable permanent commemoration of the Garden's 200 year anniversary. It is intended to place the statue on its original plinth on the "Diana Island" which is accessed by a wooden bridge and is opposite the punt harbour. A dignatory is currently being sought for the "unveiling" of the statue. Light refreshments will be served.
